Transylvania Resettlement Situation Still Being Pushed

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 22—Reconsideration of moving more than two hundred and fifty Negro families from the Transylvania Resettlement project near Lake Provident, Louisiana, have been suggested to Federal authorities by white prominent business people of that area and by other prominent persons of the state.

O. C. W. TAYLOR ACTIVE

A recent letter addressed to Mr. O. C. W. Taylor, Louisiana representative of The Pittsburgh Courier and local school principal who has given much time and effort in this direction, from Mr. James W. Thompson, publisher of the New Orleans Daily Item, included the following statement: "I am convinced from what you have told me

and have explained to our editor, Mr. Marshall Ballard, that the Federal government should look carefully into the requests that you and others are making regarding this situation.

"I am confident that when your request is presented to President Roosevelt he will delegate someone to look into the entire matter, and pass on it in a constructive way."

LETTER TO PRESIDENT

"I am therefore writing you this letter and asking that when you have prepared the whole case to present to the President, that you submit this letter to him as a request from me to give serious consideration to the matter in question."

Mr. Thompson is one of the most influential business men in the south and undoubtedly one of the most respected public spokesmen. It is hoped and expected that the personal interest of such persons in the situation will go a long way in influencing the final decision of the Resettlement Administration in reconsideration of the proposed removal.

The interruption of the well being of these families in placing white farmers on the land grants that they have developed over three quarters of a century, would not be in harmony with the purpose of the resettlement program; is the attitude taken by most of those whose interest has been aroused.

FINAL ACTION NEAR

Mr. Taylor has been in correspondence with Mr. J. O. Walker, Director of the Resettlement division of the Farm Administration, and is optimistic as to the final action of the administration. Petitions signed by scores of business people in Lake Provident and in surrounding territories have been forwarded to the President and the Farm Administration. The Governor of Louisiana has also been
