has been heaped upon the poor Negroes and the poor whites of many sections of the South for years... but the circumstances surrounding this case are of such a nature that they have been forwarded to Secretary Wallace in the hope that something can be done.

Names of principals in the disgraceful transaction must necessarily be kept a secret... because it's more than the sharecropper's life is worth, if it were known that someone is trying to see that he gets his "day in court."

Here are the facts:
 Sometime ago, this sharecropper approached his landowner, in an effort to get his allotment from the twenty acres of land that he worked. The land-owner promised to go to the local office of the A.A.A., and arrange for the allotment, which was to be paid off in 1939.

Two weeks later, his land-owner took him to the office. Upon

him that he had signed away his rights. The Negro sharecropper, unknowingly, had signed a mortgage, also, of \$360, with accrued interest at 8 per cent.

Items listed included a wagon, plows, cultivator, mule, horse, corn and other farm implements.

When the crop was finished, which included 13 bales of cotton, the land-owner swooped down on him and showed the papers he had signed.

Informing him that these were the mortgage papers, he went into the crib, took the corn and hay and gave the sharecropper 24 hours in which to vacate the premises.

Facts tend to prove that the land-owner had usurped the authority of the government. He had acted without any authority. He had overstepped his bounds and the Pittsburgh Courier has interested itself in the plight of this man to get the home office of the A.A.A. to act.

FORCE LOUISIANA FARMERS TO MOVE

despite the fact that Negroes have been predominately in the majority on this plantation as tenant farmers for more than 100 years.

MOVED LIKE SHEEP, WITH NOTHING TO SAY

Both the "qualified" and the "un-qualified" Negroes are being moved like sheep... and they can't say anything.

Many of those listed as "un-qualified" are being sent to plantations where only the best risks or the "qualified" were supposed to be sent. There seems to be no definiteness of purpose in sending them.

Some are being sent to Thomastown, a government project. Others are being sent to the Holland Delta Farm, a privately-owned project. Still others are being huddled to Henderson, another government project. Many have been sent to privately-owned plantations in the vicinity. The only definite thing seemingly in evidence is the slogan being carried out: "Move the Negroes Out of Transylvania."

DO NOT UNDERSTAND THE REQUIREMENTS

Many of those contacted by this writer could not explain why they had been listed as "qualified" or "unqualified." They had no idea of what the qualification requirements were.

One farmer, an ex-soldier with a World War record for overseas service, stated he had been told he could not qualify, but further inquiry elicited no more information. He is 41 years old, and has been doing successful farming in his present location. Told to move "on the morrow," he had no idea of where he was going. He had no plans. The authorities had told him they MIGHT find a place for

him to go, but they did not tell him the conditions under which he could go.

FARMERS MOVING INTO DILAPIDATED SHACKS

A visit was made to the Holland Delta plantation, where many had been whisked away... with a 24-hour notice. The houses on this plantation were found to be entirely uninhabitable. Every one of them. The roofs were leaky. Large cracks were observed in the sides of the homes. In many instances there was no water. None of these houses have barns nor cribs in which corn can be kept. Some of the farmers were forced to move their corn into overcrowded houses.

INTIMIDATION CLAIMED IN MANY INSTANCES

Intimidation of some of the tenants on the project has been claimed by many. In one instance it was claimed that B. A. Brady, community manager, threatened body injury to one of the tenants who was active in assisting others get what they felt was right. Some claim they have been promised "qualifications" if they would do as the administration wanted them to do.

An authenticated report was circulated to the effect that the community manager had ordered the schools stopped, but that classes were continued. Those attesting to the veracity of the story wanted their names withheld.

PEOPLE WORRIED ABOUT THEIR FUTURE

Tenants on the project are worried. No provisions have been made for them on other plantations where they were supposed to be moved. Some people were moved from some of the projects to which the Transylvania people were removed and were not given places to go. These have been left strand-
